Stepping into the New Year with Hope

A new year often arrives with a sense of freshness — a blank page with nothing on it, a chance to begin again.

In church we are mindful of the presence of God at this time, who walks with us through every season past and promises to go with us into every season to come.

Many of us will carry mixed feelings into January. Some will look back with gratitude — for blessings received, for prayers answered, for love shared and milestones reached. Others will hold memories of difficulty or loss. Yet nothing from the year behind us is unseen by God. Yet more goings-on at the PCC

The Parochial Church Council (PCC) met on the evening of Tuesday 25th November. Here is a brief update on some of the things that we talked about, and the decisions made.

Mission

Rev'd Julia announced that we will be holding a 'Parish Vision & Values Day' on Saturday 17th January. This event will be open to all. The aim is to start planning the next phase of our mission and ministry in the local community.

Rev'd Julia also announced that a new Curate would be starting to work with us from June 2026 onwards, for a period of 3 years. The new member of staff will be Nilesch Patel, who is being ordained Deacon on 27th of June, and his first service with us will be on the following day. Nilesch will be a self-supporting minister whilst with us, and therefore mainly active in the parish at weekends.

Encouraging progress was reported with our ministry to younger people. Nine young people had attended the Youth Mass on 23rd November, and five young adults had joined the evening event organised by Rowland.

Hall Renovation

Annabel reported that we had received a grant of £6,400 from the Benefact Trust to help towards the repair of the roof. The next phase of the work will be the development of space for small meetings on the south side of the Hall — an enlargement of our existing meeting room facility. The PCC agreed to the spending of up to £10,000 to start the design, planning, and permission process for this work.

Church Flat Roof Repairs

Steve reported that work on the lower flat roof of the church had recently been completed to deal with rainwater ingress to the clergy vestry and old

boiler room, and to carry out preventive maintenance above the Lady Chapel and Children's Chapel. Stephen reported that a Perspex dome (skylight) above the south corridor, which had become damaged during a gale, would be replaced in the near future.

Inspecting Architect

Steve reported that our Inspecting Architect, John Scott, is retiring and has tendered his resignation. John has given expert, dedicated service to the Parish over the past 7 years. It will therefore be necessary to start the appointment process for a new architect, well before our next periodic inspection, due to take place in September 2026.

Live streaming of Sunday Service

Live streaming is currently on pause because our equipment and software are life-expired. Finding cost-effective replacements has not proved easy. The Committee agreed to set up a working group to take this matter forward, with the aim of resuming live streaming so that the output can be viewed on our new website. This facility will also be useful for church weddings and funerals, since it is often requested on such occasions.

The Week of Prayer for Christian Unity 18th to 25th January

This year the prayers and reflections are from the Armenian Apostolic Church, along with the Armenian Catholic and Evangelical Churches.

These resources draw upon centuries-old traditions of prayer and petitions used by the Armenian people, along with hymns that originated in the ancient monasteries and churches of Armenia, some of which date as far back as the fourth century.

They extend an invitation to draw upon this shared Christian heritage and to delve more deeply into our fellowship in Christ, which unites Christians worldwide.

World Leprosy Sunday - 25th January 2026

We read about leprosy in the Bible and assume it is a disease of the past. But leprosy is very much a disease of today, with more than 200,000 newly diagnosed cases every year.

That means that every two minutes of every day, someone hears the words 'you have leprosy'. Three short words, but they carry thousands of years' worth of fear, stigma and shame.

Leprosy thrives in areas where poor nutrition, overcrowding, shared wash facilities and low standards of living naturally lower people's immune systems.

Lepers will suffer growing numbness and worsening nerve damage, ulcers and finally even amputations. They will also suffer the hurt and shame of being an outcast, often abandoned by their own families.

And this is where The Leprosy Mission steps in, and with the support of churches in the UK, works to help the sufferers of leprosy around the world. The Leprosy Mission is a medical Christian mission which helps people with leprosy both medically, spiritually, and practically. With your help, their Leprosy Mission Vocational Training Centres can give sufferers a chance to learn a skill and get a qualification.

In Mark 1, the leper said to Jesus, 'If you are willing, you can heal me.' That plea still stands today – if we are willing, we can help The Leprosy Mission to still do Christ's work of healing and rehabilitation today.

Why we have Plough Sunday

In bygone years, the supply chain of food across Britain was fairly short: if it didn't grow in your local fields, you were apt to go hungry. Hence the widespread traditional custom of Plough Sunday – bringing a plough (and sometimes a lamb as well) into church and praying for God's blessing on the land in the year ahead.

Traditionally, Plough Sunday was held on the Sunday after Epiphany, which makes 11th January this year's special day. Parishioners would often walk through their village collecting alms for the poor, before gathering down at the church. Farmers would sometimes roll up on their tractors at the church door (though there are no stories of any farmer trying to bring his tractor into the church!) Work on the fields would then begin on Plough Monday, the day after the prayers for blessing.

These days, with supermarkets delivering food all year round, the nature of Plough Sunday has changed into a general celebration of farming and the work of farmers. In the C of E's Common Worship there is a suggested prayer for the 'Blessing of the Plough'.
